## **Dreaming of Tulips in January!**

Visit Nijkerk, birthplace of our founding father, Arendt van Curler



April 22 to May 6, 2004 is set for another visit to Nijkerk, the Netherlands. The Nijkerk-Schenectady Foundation has invited 35 guests representing Schenectady to come and visit their community for

these two weeks. Three annual Dutch holidays will be celebrated: The Queen's Birthday, Remembrance Day and Liberation Day. And it's tulip time!

2004 is a special year as it marks the twentieth anniversary of exchanges between the two localities. It all began in 1984 when a delegation came to Schenectady from Nijkerk to see and learn about the city founded by their native son. Arendt van Curler.

This is how the trip plans work: participants pay for their round trip airfare (\$645 from Albany Airport), for thank you gifts and a farewell dinner for their host family, \$25 dues to join the Schenectady/Nijkerk Council, and a \$50 processing fee.

Also, you may want to be part of a youth exchange. In July of 2004 (exact dates still to be determined) 10 teenage youth are coming from Nijkerk to visit Schenectady. Host families, drivers, and day guides are needed as well as financial and other forms of support. Time aboard the replica of Henry Hudson's 1609 exploration ship, the *Half Moon*, is being planned as part of the exchange. ## Stockade Association Board Meeting 12/2/03 Minutes at SCHS

President Joe Fava called this meeting to order at 7:00 pm. Others present included Bob Briber, Connie Colangelo, Diane DeMeo, Brad Fisher, Dale Miller, Peter Rumora and Susanna Sherwood. The minutes of the previous meeting were approved, as was a Treasurer's report submitted by Lyn Gordon: only one \$150 check, for a house painting award, had been issued since the last meeting. Brad Fisher will inquire about Walkabout income, which has not been received to date. Eli's suggested topic, that we more thoroughly organize the Board, was postponed until he could be present.

A motion was made and seconded, "to abolish the sidewalk and painting awards," and considerable discussion ensued. The arguments in favor seem to be that since the award is targeted to only a few people, it is discriminatory. The money should be spent more widely to benefit the whole Stockade and not just a few homeowners. Furthermore, the amount is too small to serve as an incentive for painting a house or repairing a sidewalk. The rules for the awards are not widely understood so some qualified recipients have not applied. The arguments against seem to be that the award represents a real value for the Association, in that we want house improvements. House painting and sidewalk repairs are important goals - as such, it doesn't matter if the amount helps much or not; think of it as a "reward." However, the amount, to some, is significant - it may pay for the paint. Finally, the Board has been under some criticism for not spending the money we have amassed. To eliminate modest expenditures like these seems unjustified and possibly unpopular. The motion was tabled until Connie gathers the rules for the awards.

The Board reviewed Association membership requirements: Dues are to be paid between 9/1 and 12/31, to be in good standing. It was agreed that Joe would collect all the addresses of people who live in the Stockade, and a letter would be sent to all, in August, urging them to join the Association. Bob Briber will do a first draft. The <u>SPY</u> should have a banner headline in its first fall issue, urging folks to join or renew.

Joe will write the President's letter for the <u>SPY</u> by its deadline of 12/15.

Eli, Diane and Peter met to discuss the Memorial Day picnic idea. Their resolution was that a <u>SPY</u> article should be written which describes the pleasant history of the event and solicits new workers to help reinstitute it. Eli knows its history well. The event is <u>a lot</u> of work and needs lots of participation; if no one comes forward as a result of the solicitation, there is not enough interest.

The Board then spent considerable time reviewing the Tree Lighting ceremony and social gathering, Kerst Kermis and other administrative matters.

Under new business: • the next general meeting, January 15, was discussed. Eli has already scheduled Fred Miller to talk. • we need a big sign, at the entrance to Washington Ave by SCCC that says "NO TRUCKS." They remain a major problem.

• finally, it was argued that we need someone to specialize in publicity for the Association; a name or two was suggested. These matters can go on the agenda for the **next meeting**, **January 6**, **2004** 

The meeting adjoined at 9:00 pm.




Chris Dobson and Jazz

When I travel out of Schenectady, I tend to go west. Traffic thins, and I love the Mohawk Valley. The drive along route five offers lovely vistas of the river. It is my own personal continuation of walking in Riverside Park.

My favorite place is the Schoharie Crossing in Fort Hunter. It is here where the Schoharie Creek meets the Mohawk River, just past lock number twelve in Tribes Hill. In summer the creek is a busy boat launch, often filled with children, frisbies and picnics enjoyed in the shade. Here I can gaze on the aqueduct engineers designed during work on the Erie Canal. The aqueduct is a crumbling mountain of art and in the last few years portions have tumbled into the creek. Nonetheless, it is still a feast for the eye and the imagination.

Across from this spectacle is perhaps ten acres of cow corn. Bleached a pale yellow color the corn dries and waits for harvesting. I don't know why the farmer hasn't gotten in there yet, but unknowingly he has done something wonderful for me. My senses cannot get enough of this corn. Color and texture. The rich Southwestern yellows of the kernels I've peeked at in my walks through the stalks. The wind beating the leaves like paper drums and the damp warm smell of earth.

A friend has made photographs and I keep them in my studio. My space filled with canvases of corn. Can't make enough paintings. The images in my brain come back again and again. This simple field. This beautiful place.



## Birds of the Stockade

One of the birds that I have seen in and around the Stockade is the Slate-colored race of the Dark eyed Junco. It is 6 1/4 inches long. The male is pretty much dark gray, the female is brownish gray overall. Both sexes have a pink bill, white underparts and white outer tail feathers. The song is a musical trill on one pitch. They breed in coniferous woods, and occasionally feed under feeders. A few years ago in Maine I watched a Junco with its mouth full of mosquitoes feed its chicks.
