
Nov. Spy Deadline


First attend the lecture at 10:30 AM at the Historical Society, and then go to the Stockade Inn for a delicious buffet lunch.



Stockade Association General Membership Meeting September 16, 2004

Board members present: Joe Fava, Brad Fisher, Deb Douglas, Dale Miller, Lyn Gordon, Diane DeMeo Peter Rumora, Connie Colangelo, Fred Kindl

Joe Fava called the meeting to order at 7:30 PM. The first agenda item was a slide show presentation set to music of the 2003 Walkabout and Waterfront Faire, prepared by Helen Penna and presented by Lon Penna. The group appreciated the show, and the time and effort that went into preparing it. Many thanks to Helen and Lon!

May Minutes

Bob Briber made a motion to accept the minutes of the May general membership meeting. Karen Johnson seconded and the minutes were passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Lyn Gordon reported a list of current expenditures and account balances, including the purchase of Quicken to track revenue and expenses. She also reported that a budget is in progress and will be available for review at each general meeting. A suggestion was made to publish the budget in the *Spy* at the beginning and end of the fiscal year. All *Spy* finances will be returned to the Board and set up as a line item on the budget. Jennifer Wells made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Ellen Desmond seconded the motion and the report was accepted unanimously.

Committee Reports

Walkabout

Sylvie Briber reported that the Walkabout is on track for September 18th, with the exception of volunteers. Joe thanked each of the sponsors that made the expansion of the event possible: MVP, Bank of America, Time Warner, I Love NY and the Chamber of Schenectady County, Amtrak, Union College, Eastern Office Supply and Realty USA.

Christmas

Diane DeMeo reported that plans are in motion for the December 5th Kerst Kermis. The VanDyck will host the CASA artists, and the Stockade Inn will host the crafters. Plans for the tree lighting and reception are also in the works. Joe mentioned to the group that we are looking for someone to pay for the Christmas tree

at the Indian, and Jennifer Wells generously offered to do so. We are also looking for a Stockade Association family member 10 years old or younger to light the tree.

Garden Group

The new chair of the garden group, Steve Kowalski, reported that the Garden Tour was a success, generating \$7,900 before expenses. The group is already laying the foundation for the 2006 tour. Work is continuing on the garden at the end of Ingersoll Ave. and as always, new volunteers are always needed to help with the various projects.

Art Show

Connie Colangelo reported that the art show was a success by all accounts. With the cooperative weather, the artists had a very good day. Connie remarked that the artists are appreciative of the fact that the art show continues to hold up its standard of art only. She thanked all the volunteers that made the event possible, and mentioned that they need more volunteers for next year, and additionally people who are willing to serve on the board. The art show gave back to the community a \$500 scholarship and \$1,200 in prize money.

By-Laws

Dale Miller reported that the by-laws committee continues to meet regularly, and any suggestions should be directed to Eli Taub via phone or e-mail.

Old Business

New Traffic Pattern

Dale Miller has drawn up potential changes to the existing traffic pattern and will meet with Karl Olsen to discuss their feasibility. The general membership will have opportunity for feedback at the appropriate time.

108 Union Street

A 2nd letter has been sent to the Historic District Commission requesting 108 Union Street be deemed part of the historic district. Karen Johnson mentioned that the planning commission may have proposed the ordinance, and will check with Steve Strichman. There was discussion regarding our liason to the commission, and Meredith Anker recommended that we ask Debbie Lambeth to fill the role.

Air Traffic

Larry Schmidt reported that Fred Miller of the Mohawk Valley Heritage Corridor suggested we outline our concerns, propose solutions, and then approach Stratton AFB and Colonel Della Pia to discuss the situation. The Stockade is listed on the National Historic Register, and through the National Historic Preservation Act, the planes should not be flying over the neighborhood. There was much discussion as to how to approach Stratton, and progress will be reported as it is made.

New Business

Lyn presented the new Stockade Association membership card that will be given to all members. The card entitles members to a 10% discount at the Van Dyck, and we will be soliciting other businesses for specials as well. Also, Jennifer Wells agreed to be the chair of the membership committee.

Moon and River

Richard Genest reported on tentative plans to open a storefront on the So. Ferry side of Holistic Alternatives. He is also working with the owner of the building to discuss possible improvements to the facade of the building. He invited everyone to drop in to Moon and River any time to view the current art on display, have a bite to eat and listen to live music.

Website

Jennifer Wells requested that anyone who may have any history on the Riverside Condominiums, or any other bit of Stockade history, forward it to her for use on our website.

Signage

There was discussion on how to go about getting signs in other parts of the neighborhood to alert dog owners to pick up after their pets, as there are dog owners who are not following the local law. There was also discussion about dogs not on leashes, and the ever-present cat problem.

Public Hearing

Connie pointed out that the city is holding a public hearing on the proposed budget for next year, which includes proposed fees that will increase taxes again. She encouraged everyone to go to the rally on Tuesday, October 12, at 6:00 PM, followed by the public hearing at 7:00 PM to show opposition to the fees.

There being no further business, Joe requested a motion to adjourn. Ellen Desmond made a motion to adjourn, Greg Sauer seconded, and the meeting was adjourned at 9:15.

Stockade Association Board Meeting Tuesday, September 7, 2004

President Joe Fava called the meeting to order at 7:08 PM. Also present were Dale Miller, Deb Douglas, Eli Taub, Diane DeMeo, Peter Rumora, Bob Preville, Lyn Gordon, Kim Mabee and Fred Kindl.

Treasurer's Report

Lyn presented the treasurer's report and after brief discussion, Peter made a motion to accept the report. Eli seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.

Committee Reports

- Garden Group Joe reported that discussions are continuing with the group in regards to integrating their finances back into the Board.
- Walkabout Lyn presented the 36-page program and pointed out that the program was merely 1 sheet of paper only a few years ago. Recognition should go to the sponsors who made the expansion of the event possible: Eastern Office Supply, I Love NY, the Chamber of Schenectady County, and the *Gazettte*.
- Kerst Kermis Diane reported that the event planning is moving along, with the addition of the Stockade Inn as a venue, along with the Van Dyck.

New Business

- Spy content Eli would like to see a space reserved in the Spy each month for priority board business. Lyn will act as liason to Sylvie to communicate the items from the board.
- **Welcome Packets** Lyn began the discussion regarding the creation of welcome packets for new neighbors, and the importance of welcoming them and communicating with them. It was suggested to put a note in the *Spy* to encourage new residents to attend meetings to get involved, and that a personal phone call from board members would be a nice touch. Diane will work on putting the packets together.
- Warning Cards Lyn presented 2 cards that have been used in the past to remind residents about not parking on sidewalks and trash code violation. The cards would be presented as part of the Neighborhood Watch program.
- Membership Cards Lyn will have the new Association membership cards available at the general meetings. The cards can be used at certain locations to obtain discounts details to follow. There was discussion as to who will chair the membership committee, and it was agreed to ask a certain person to chair, with assistance from Dale and Eli.

Old Business

- 501C 3 Eli reported that after conducting some research into our current tax-exempt status, with respect to applying for grants in the future, the 501C 3 status is preferable to keep.
- Stratton AFB Eli reported that Fred Miller of the Mohawk Valley Heritage Corridor suggested that we draft an outline of the problem with the planes, along with a proposed solution, and then meet with the Commander. Eli and Larry Schmidt will continue to work on this situation and report their progress.
- Police presence in Riverside Park Lyn met with Chief Geraci to thank him for the continued police presence in the park, and also to inquire about possible alternatives to driving along the sidewalk, which creates deep ruts and collects puddles of stagnant water. Lyn reported that the Chief was very agreeable, and the ruts were filled with gravel within a few days.

There being no further business, Dale made a motion to adjourn at 8:45. Diane seconded and the motion was passed unanimously.

Priority Board Business

Report From Your By-Laws Committee

A by-laws committee was formed by the Stockade Association president 6 months ago to review our infrastructure. The impetus for this review were the procedural and other problems, relating to the by-laws, that has been cropping up, making it difficult to conduct our business in a 21st century manner from time to time. Bob Briber, Dale Miller, Lyn Gordon, and I, as the committee, spent a good deal of time reviewing our by-laws and those of other organizations, before determining what changes were needed. Greg Sauer has joined us, and we continue our work on this project. I will be reporting to you, in the Spy, as we do our work. We will also be soliciting your input and comments as we work out suggested changes. We expect to present the revised document at the annual meeting in May 2005 (the only time changes can be made under the current document). 

To continue the comfort and elegance, a continental buffet breakfast of fruit, bagels, yogurt, juices, coffee, and tea flows out of a sideboard nestled in a corner on the same floor as the rooms, convenient to all guests.

First Reformed Church to Re-Open in October

The cork for the new floor of the santuary has arrived from Portugal enabling First Reformed Church's renovations to proceed and its schedule for re-opening to remain on track for Sunday, October 3. Renovations to both the exterior and interior have kept the church closed since June. The church is located at the corner of Union and North Church Streets. All are invited to attend the 10 AM re-vesture service and any service thereafter.

Though the church as a congregation was the first established in Schenectady dating back to 1680, the church buildings through the years have not fared so well. Several fires have forced re-building projects, most recently in 1948. Much of the exterior built in 1862 survived that fire but this summer mortar joints were strengthened, exterior stonework was cleaned and some of it replaced.

Inside the santuary, all the pews were removed for re-finishing; the cork floor, whose required thickness could only be found in Portugal, was replaced; and new lighting and sound systems were installed. A few rows of pews in front and in back have been removed to accommodate more creativity in worship. Weakened stained glass windows have been releaded. The work has cost \$1.4 million.

Smaller interior projects have been accomplished or are planned for other areas of the church. The congregation will celebrate its 325th anniversary in 2005.
