

How a Dutch Colonial Village **Became an American City**

Vol. 1: The Colonial Crucible, 1661-1774



This eagerly awaited scholarly work by Dr. Susan Staffa has been recently completed and will be available on Sat., Nov. 13, 12:00 at the Historical Society.

Stockade neighbor, Sociologist and Professional Susan J. Staffa, Ph.D. Editor, Malcolm Willison, says, "This history of Schenectady is thorough and penetrating, illuminated by the author's anthropological training, her understanding of how interpersonal ties determined the nature of the community, and how diverse cultures intersected. Her understanding of the villagers' relations with the local Mohawks and the Iroquois Confederation clarifies how the village managed to thrive so close to a risky frontier. This book is very well written, and Staffa's easy style, together with her maps (14), charts (6), and tables (34), makes the many complicated social intersections of families and their histories easy to follow, so that readers can trace both the social and geographic emergence of this very interesting colonial community." It also contains 14 chapters and 31 illustrations, along with bibliography and index. (continued on page 4)

Jay Street Store offers 21st Century Solution: eBay Consignment Service

Parcel Post Plus, a packaging and shipping center, located at 124 Jay St. is offering a first for Schenectady - the ability for the person who is either too busy or not computer comfortable the ability to sell on eBay, without hassle.

The eBay website features literally millions of items that people world wide are willing to sell auction style. By offering this service on the web, geography is no longer an issue for people who may have a special interest in an item yet may not be in the same town. In addition, sellers can add items for sale 24 hours 7 days a week and shoppers can buy items on the same schedule.

Auctions Made EZ couldn't be any more apt of a name. All you need to do is bring an item that you would like to list on eBay into the Parcel Post Plus Store at 124 Jay St. The professional staff there does the rest - takes digital pictures of the item, and using the key words that you provide, posts the item for sale on the eBay website. Parcel Post Plus even stores the item for you if you wish. In approximately two weeks you receive a check in the mail for your item, less the consignment fee of approximately 35 percent. The buyer on eBay even pays for the shipping.

According to Parcel Post Plus owner, Greg Salomon, eBay consignment shops are popping up all over the country and are especially popular on the west coast and the major metropolitan areas. "Offering this service from our store here which is already an authorized UPS and FedEx shipping center was a natural."

"One of the biggest hassles for eBay sellers has been calculating the shipping costs correctly so that the seller doesn't lose money. Also, packaging items correctly so that they arrive intact and on time is equally important, also a natural extension for Parcel Post Plus."

Stockade Association Board Meeting Tuesday, October 5, 2004

Present: Joe Fava, Deb Douglas, Peter Rumora, Eli Taub, Dale Miller, Kim Miller, Lyn Gordon, Bob Preville, Fred Kindl

Joe Fava called the meeting to order at 7:05. Peter made a motion to approve the September board minutes. Fred seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Treasurer's Report

Lyn reported on the current finances of the association. The budget will be available at each general meeting for members to review. Eli made a motion to accept the treasurer's report. Dale seconded the motion, which passed unanimously. Lyn also reported that the *Spy* is prepared to integrate their finances into the board's budget.

New Business

Stockade entrance

Eli initiated discussion on improved signage at the entrances to the Stockade. It was agreed that it would benefit visitors and neighbors to have the entrances more readily identified. Fred suggested we contact Schenectady Heritage Foundation as to restrictions on signage in the district, and to check carefully as to the cost of production and installation. Eli suggested we contact historic zoning commission to see if they have jurisdiction over historic sign installation. Joe stated we should keep in mind a potential partnership with the Chamber when they move in to the Gillette House. Dale suggested the infrastructure committee take photos of entrances and design possible signage scenarios to present to organizations as needed. The discussion turned to updating the plaques that designate historic homes in the Stockade, and the procedure required to obtain or update a plaque. Dale will head up a group to begin the process of photographing existing plaques, starting the initial discussion of a possible re-design of the plagues, and also identifying the structures that do not have plaques and may be eligible.

Banner

Lyn would like to have a banner created for events that the Stockade Association participates in. Joe also suggested looking into the cost of an accordion-type presentation board. Lyn will look into size, cost, etc. and report back to the board.

Membership Committee

Jennifer Wells and Bob Preville will co-chair the membership committee, sharing the tasks required to organize a membership database.

November General Meeting

Ray Gillen, Chairman of Schenectady Metroplex, is scheduled to be the speaker for the November meeting.

Committee Reports

Finance - There was no report, the budget will be available in print for review at the November general meeting.

By-laws - Eli reported that the by-laws committee met in September, and are making progress. They should be finished with a draft for board discussion in the next 2 months.

Spy - Lyn distributed to the group a list of publishing deadlines for the *Spy*.

Walkabout - Lyn reported that despite the very uncooperative weather, the turn-out was decent and feedback has been good. Final revenue will be reported when all expenses are accounted for.

Kerst Kermis/Christmas - The Kerst Kermis is set for December 5 at the VanDyck and Stockade Inn. The Christmas tree lighting is set for 5:30 at the Indian. We previously reported that Jennifer Wells would be donating the tree this year, but instead Jean Zegger will donate the tree, in memory of her husband, Jack. Jennifer will sponsor the tree next year. Reverend White from the First Reformed will officiate the tree-lighting, and will bring with him belf chimers or a choir. The reception at St. George's will immediately follow the tree lighting.

Old Business

Stratton AFB/Planes - Eli, Fred Miller and Larry Schmidt are meeting with Colonel Max Della Pia, Commander at Stratton, this week to discuss the situation of the planes flying over the neighborhood. Progress will be reported.

With no further business to attend to, Eli made a motion to adjourn. Dale seconded the motion which passed unanimously. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 PM.



Stockade Walkabout 2004



September 18, 2004. Pouring rain. Volunteers putting up tents in a downpour, setting up signage and traffic barricades soaked to the skin. What was to become of our 45th Stockade Walkabout? As predicted, the skies cleared at noon and we were in business.

Visitors rode our tree lined streets in horse drawn carriages, listened to the Union College Jazz ensemble at Arthur's Market, strolled down to the river to sample the offerings of eight differ-

ent Schenectady restaurants while children rode a pony or petted the animals at the petting zoo. This year there were seven historic homes open to the public as well as three churches, three restaurants, the civic playhouse, the Schenectady Historical Society and the YWCA.

The co-chairs all three years have been John Samatulski from DSIC, Kim Mabee from the Historical Society, Lyn Gordon representing the Stockade Association and Sylvie Briber, member at large. This has proven to be a formidable and well-oiled team.

We would like to extend our thanks to all of our neighbors who opened their houses or businesses for this event and to all who volunteered their time and talents to this endeavor. Without your help we could not continue with this successful event year after year.

Time Immemorial

Once upon a time when a person of prominence died, a memorial would be erected, tabulated with the name, pertinent dates and accomplishments of the descendant's life. One such name that comes to mind for a memorial is Dominick "Min" Rotundo.

For many years Min Rotundo lived in the College Park neighborhood and took great pride beautifying Park Place Park. Upon his death the city of Schenectady was left monies from his estate to pay for the upkeep of that park. As fate would have it, the city instead changed Riverside Park to Rotundo Park and forgot all about Park Place Park.

Fast forward to 1998: with the urging of former Stockade President Bob Hayner, I asked and got permission from Min's remaining relatives to submit the name change from Rotundo back to Riverside Park to then city councilman Brian Stratton for full city council approval. It made sense since most New York State tourism brochures list it as Riverside Park. More recently, I invited Brian to the park and showed him the pump house and promenade's grand restoration. As he was looking further around into the park he noticed the lack of recognition for Min Rotundo. Interestingly, during Brian's tenure in the early 90's as an "Association" board member, the idea for a memorial in honor of "Min" had once been brought up but, of course, nothing has come of it. I assured Brian a followup. This past summer I spoke with Association President Fava and he asked me to submit the idea for the memorial.

Here it is: to help jump start this all-important memorial I will donate \$100, once the sighting is determined. It would be a fitting tribute in honor of a dedicated volunteer who was a lover of the city's parks. Perhaps a memorial the size of Emily Polachek's (on the east end of Riverside Park) with a simple stone and new tree or flowers that bloom annually would work best. Whatever it is, let's make it happen.
