



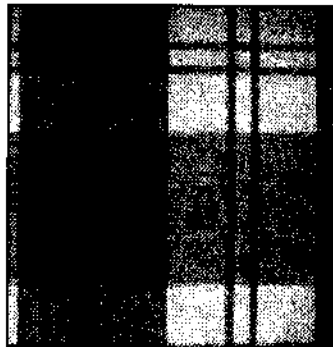

Official Schenectady Flag

St. George's Day - Sun., May 1

Patronal Mass, Procession, and Proclamation



This special day in the Stockade begins at St. George's Church, 30 North Ferry St. with the Solemnity of the Martyrdom of Saint George Patronal Mass with guest preacher, the Reverend Charles W. Sheerin, Jr., interim Rector of St. Peter's of Albany. Special music for the Mass starts at 8:50 AM with a 10 minute setting by The Berkshire Brass Quartet, followed by The St. Nicholas Children's Choir, along with Organ, Timpani and Bagpipes. Choral pieces for the occasion include "Missa Brevis No. 3," written by Brian Hoffman, Music Director. The Mass will include a Blessing of the Tartan.

At 10 AM, following the Mass, there will be a procession through the Stockade. Then on the steps of the Stockade Inn, the St. Andrew's Society will make an official presentation, giving the "Lindsay" Flag to the Stockade Inn, proclaiming it the official flag of the City of Schenectady. The Stockade Inn is the seat of the first public school in the City and so deemed appropriate to display the flag. Alexander Lindsay Glen, born in Scotland, was the first to settle on the North side of the Mohawk River in 1658. Through his bravery, many lives were spared during the Stockade Massacre. In 1739, his great-granddaughter, Debra Glen, married John Sanders of Albany. His home is now the Glen Sanders Mansion.

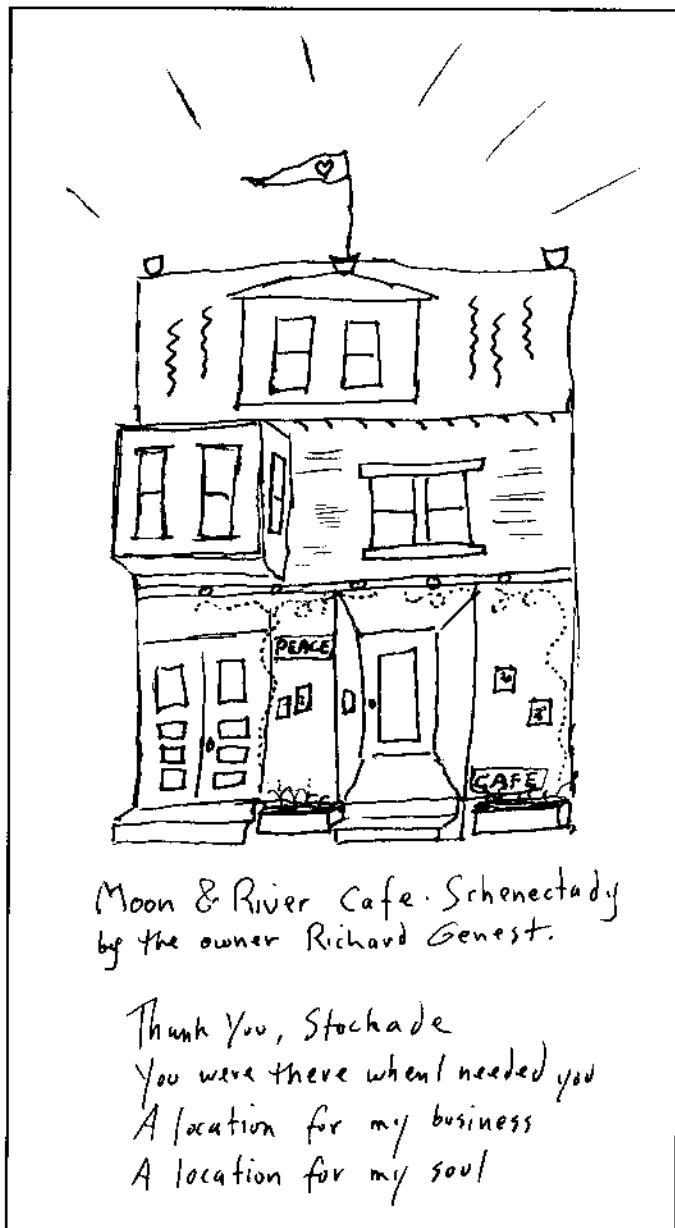

Board Meeting Minutes
April 5, 2005**

Present: Joe Fava, Debbi Douglas, Lyn Gordon, Peter Rumora, Connie Colangelo, Fred Kindl and Bob Preville. Beth Petta, Steve Strichman and John Samatulski were present as guests.

Joe called the meeting to order at 7:05pm.

Beth Petta proposed some ideas to update our street sign posts as part of our master plan. Uniform street signs would lend to uniformity and the charm that we are trying to maintain in the Stockade. She presented the board with some ideas from other communities, and then proposed some options to pay for the street sign posts and installation, including grant funding and individual sponsorship. Beth will keep the board updated as she receives information, pricing, etc., and we will keep the membership informed as to incorporating this idea into the master plan. Joe thanked Beth for her time and efforts in researching this aspect of our master plan.

Steve Strichman reviewed for the board the history of the City's efforts to install a seasonal dock at Riverside Park. Steve then lead a good discussion regarding various facets of such a project including usage, dock size and type, costs, location and grants. John Samatulski was instrumental in creating a rapport with the NYS Canal Corporation for the Walkabout last year, and he

is leading a small group to the Canal Corp. for a meeting this month to gather information and investigate the potential of a dock or barge at Riverside Park. Joe thanked Steve and John for all of their efforts, and Peter made a motion to continue to pursue the possibility of installing a seasonal dock at Riverside Park. Lyn seconded the motion, which passed unanimously.

Board Business

Connie made a motion to accept the March 2005 board meeting minutes. Peter accepted and the motion passed unanimously. After Lyn presented the treasurer's report, Fred made a motion to accept, Bob seconded and the motion passed unanimously.

Logo Development

In Dale's absence, Joe presented the board with the four submissions received since January for the design of the Stockade logo. Peter made a motion that the board prefers the "circle" design, Deb seconded and after discussion, the motion was approved. Fred suggested to bring the designs to the general meeting for comment.

Nominating Committee

Lyn and Connie reported that the committee will present its slate of candidates at the annual meeting in May.

With no further business to discuss, Peter made a motion to adjourn, Lyn seconded and the motion was approved. The meeting adjourned at 9:00.

The Great Fludde of 2005



Tenant/friend Chris and I were smug about the Mohawk this spring. Last year, we watched with awe as giant hunks of ice raged down the river, only to be stopped in their watery tracks by the railroad bridge abutments just east of the Stockade. But this year, the docile ice, uncharacteristically well-behaved, had gently headed downstream, and while some baby icebergs

and miniature forests did float by us a few weeks earlier, a sense of swollen calm prevailed. The ice left, but the rains came, and along with the ominous forecast, equally ominous warnings of flooding in the Stockade.

By Saturday, April 2 (a tardy April Fool's prank?) around 11 pm, the level at the end of North Ferry rose to a foot and a half below flood level. Curious Stockade residents alternately exchanged greetings and quiet comments of wonder in the dark.

At 2 pm Sunday, the Mighty Mohawk reached 224 feet, two above flood level. Three firefighters were stationed at the foot of N. Ferry, like sentries guarding a potentially explosive prisoner. One fireman standing watch reported that the pumping station for sending

sewage to Anthony Street was at its maximum. It was clear that the quiet stand-off between humans and nature would be short-lived.

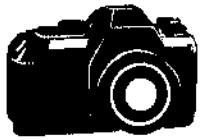
Stockade Association Joe Fava viewed the rapidly rising river, now licking the foundations of homes closest to the park, and reported that he had received a call last night from a resident inquiring about what he was going to do. I suggested he consider parting the waters. Grimacing, he watched whole trees - branches, trunk, roots and all - speed past.

Meanwhile, on Ingersoll, resident Eric Laugen at Number 26, took a philosophical attitude and quietly sipped a beer from his porch, now an island surrounded by the muddy waters of Lake Mohawk. Like a living creature, the river actually pulsated, first moving forward, then slipping back a little, then inching forward past the original point. A sign on Number 4 Ingersoll tentatively suggested it was FOR RENT. There would be no takers today.

A walk with friends back to N. Ferry around 8:30 pm the same day in a light drizzle revealed the river at least a third of the way up the street, and small groups of residents and sight-seers alike were awestruck by the quiet determination of Mother Mohawk. She was reportedly expected to crest about 1 am.

By Monday morning, a trip to the same spot revealed a more subdued Mohawk, well below flood level and minding her manners. But in her wake, she left flooded cellars, rippled mud, and memories of a briefly untamed force of nature - reminders that we mortals dare not take anything for granted.

A Reflection on the Van Dyck Restaurant March 25, 2005

The Van Dyck is an historic piece of the Stockade, and despite several owners and joint owners who were unable to continue the popularity that Marvin (long time owner) enjoyed, I found it, once more, a place to enjoy for ambience, service, and something that is often missing in Schenectady restaurants, a menu that does not rely on Italian cuisine. We have so many wonderful Italian restaurants here, and although sampling them is a pleasure, it is refreshing to find my favorite restaurant has resisted joining the crowd. The Padrone, Ralph Martuscello is on hand to speak with customers and listen to their suggestions. From appetizers to salads to entrees the focus was on choice. Diversity? Yes, and a cup of soup (Oatmeal Stout Chili) and an appetizer (Quesadillas) made more than a meal. Other items included Coconut Shrimp, Breaded Artichoke Hearts, Buffalo Chicken Wings (mild, hot or HOT!), and so on. Salads can be a major item of your meal, or accompany an entree or sandwich - a wide array offered all day, no "lunch only" cut off time - and entrees give you a choice of fish, beef, chicken, lamb, pork, or vegetarian, all with fresh seasonal vegetables. The best menus are only as good as the chef, and the Van Dyck has a winner: Neil Massaro, formerly with Lorenzo's, is certainly keeping up his fine reputation with all that he produces here. No matter what your taste, this menu is varied enough to make it easy to choose. This works well for the diverse customers the Van Dyck serves, from the young in years to the young at heart. Yes, there are desserts too, and a torte to share made my day.

For the customers sitting where the music is, upstairs, the management offers a full menu and wait service. Try the Van Dyck for music selection, always listed ahead of time, for quiet dining, for an ambience that has its unique attraction, and pleasant service, all adding to an experience I want to repeat.

Vale Cemetery, Schenectady June 12, 1 PM

Tour begins at the Caretaker's House at 907 State Street. Vale Cemetery, dedicated in 1875, is an example of the 19th century Rural Cemetery Movement and is listed on the New York State and National Register of Historic Sites in recognition of its historical and architectural significance.

Learn about the contribution of Schenectady's residents to the American Revolution and the Civil War. More than 100 Revolutionary War and 150 Civil War veterans are buried in Vale, including two Medal of Honor recipients. One of these two, George W. Tompkins, will be the subject of a dedication ceremony for his recently received bronze memorial honoring him as a Medal of Honor recipient. After the dedication ceremonies, the Tour of Vale Cemetery will include Dutch Reformed Plot, an 18th century burial ground that includes veterans from the French and Indian War and the Revolution. Hear stories ranging from the Sons of Liberty to the breaking of the Siege at Petersburg which effectively ended the Civil War.

Oakwood Cemetery, Troy Sun., May 15 1:30 PM Troy military history buff Michael Barrett will bring Civil War heroes and others back to life before your eyes with his riveting tales.

Albany Rural Cemetery, Menands, Sunday, May 22 1 PM Tour begins at the Cemetery Chapel. Hundreds, if not thousands, of Civil War soldiers are buried here. See the burial sites of Philip Schuyler (Revolutionary War), Stephen Van Rensselaer (War of 1812) and others.

Greenridge Cemetery, Saratoga Springs, Sunday, June 5 1 PM Tour starts at Sackett Gate, main entrance on Lincoln Avenue in Saratoga Springs. Cemetery established in 1844. Tour will include the Civil War Monument and Memorial Plot.

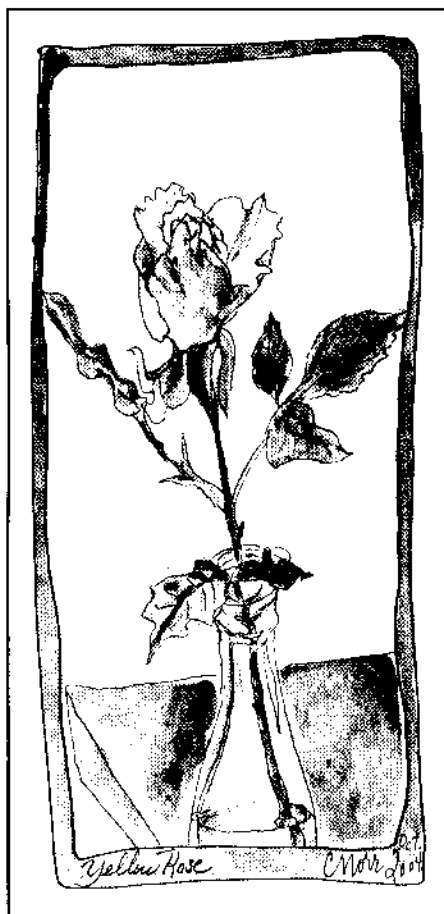

Everyday Art

I have an out-of-town friend who loves to come to Schenectady because, (according to her) it's a "real" city. No "tourist-y" attractions or glossy strip malls. Truth is, for all its shortcomings, Schenectady is an authentic kind of place. Old, established businesses, good restaurants, friendly people. And if one looks just past the superficial, past the parking lots and cyclone fences, the trashed gutters and disrepair, there is great beauty to be found in the details of its buildings. From a piece of stained glass at the Nott Memorial to a faded striped awning on Jay Street.

It's these "details" (the awning, for example) that find their way into my paintings. Colors. Stand at the Indian and find the painted brick. Pink and blue in all their subtle tints and shades. A yellow door. Cozy signs that swing in the breeze from metal arms.

Sometimes I find myself looking down South Ferry Street to Erie Boulevard. The Wolfe lock sign in the distance. Fragile apartment dwellings from another era, blue and white, fill in the landscape. Unique moldings and chimneys. There is a view of the Old Broom Factory from a spot on Green Street that never fails to visually astound me. The red painted clapboards stand adjacent to a towering blue spruce. Absolutely elegant!

I used to go mushroom picking with my old Babci. In the midst of the woods she would say, "Stop, stop and look." Stop, and take a good look. Look for the subtleties. Expect the unexpected.

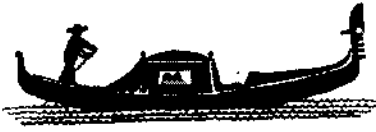

Birds of the Stockade


Some of the birds that occur in and around the Stockade are known as Neotropical Migrants because they winter in the tropics. Some will breed here, while the rest will pass through on their way further North to their breeding grounds. One such migrant that breeds around here is the Baltimore Oriole. They are mostly orange and black. Most of the Warblers are known as "Butterflies of the Bird World." They are mostly insect eaters. Orioles feed on insects and nectar from flowers and will come in for orange halves occasionally.

There are even more free activities: tours of historic sites, including New York State's Historic Schoharie Crossing Aqueduct, Schenectady's Historic Stockade (New York State's first Historic District), the Flint House, the Mabee Farm Historic Site (a three hundred year old farm located on the Erie Canal) and the Enders House, a Traditional Music and Story Telling Festival, party bands, the Schenectady Symphony Orchestra, a fire-works display, heritage dancers, Native American dancers and traditional barn dances. Children's activities abound with colonial games, story telling, face painting, musical performances, tethered hot-air balloon rides, and fire-and-rescue demonstrations. Add to all this a craft show, art show, antique car show and artisan demonstrations. And food and beverages will be available from vendors at most sites throughout the festival.
