Walking Tour of Historic Schenectady

Sat., Nov. 12 - 11 AM - 1 PM conducted by Richard Genest & John Wolcott

Be sure not to miss this special tour of the Stockade and nearby area. Richard Genest, proprietor of Moon and River Café, has teamed up with his long time friend, John Wolcott, who was recently featured in the *Daily Gazette*, discovering an old wall of the City. This partnership proves to be the start of many historic adventures yet to come!

The walking tour begins at 11 AM at the Moon and River Cafe at 115 South Ferry Street on Saturday, November 12. It will make a circle around old Schenectady, both inside and outside the Stockade walls.

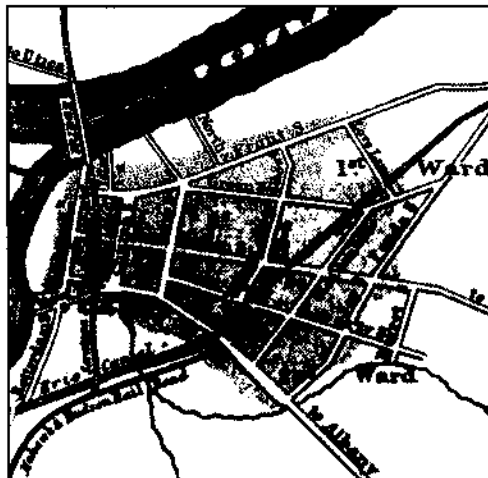
The itinerary will include:

- the former Ann Street - Wharf on the Mohawk - site of boat building, warehouses, commercial center of the city until 1819 fire
- Stockade Subway Tunnel North Entrance (S & S railroad)
- Secret Gardens of Stockade
- Site of Traditional Nude Beach on the Mohawk!
- Whitmyer Broom Factory - operated until 1980's
- Perrecca's Bakery - making a short stop for a slice

of tomato pie.

- Newly discovered brick wall of Colonial House on the road to Albany - outside the Stockade
- site of future Balcony Cafe & Historic Gift Shop in the Great Hall of Schenectady
- First grist mill on Mill Kill built in 1666 by Dutch settler Sweer Teunise

- South Entrance of Railroad Subway Tunnel (1832-46)

Stockade Association Board Meeting Minutes October 4, 2005

Present: Joe Fava, Mary D'Alasandro, Diane DeMeo, Lyn Gordon, Peter Rumora, Fred Kindl, Dale Miller and Elena Alvarez. Gloria Kishton and Jean Zegger were present as guests.

Joe called the meeting to order at 7:05pm.

Gloria Kishton, Vice-Chair of the Schenectady Heritage Foundation, informed the Board of the multi-year history of trying to rehab 221 Green Street. She stressed that it is still a top priority of the SHF and asked that the Stockade Association support their efforts. The Board agreed to send an official letter of support and designate a representative to attend any pertinent meetings.

Jean Zegger discussed the continuing problem of large planes frequently flying very low directly over the Stockade. The Board agreed that the problem is still an important one, especially since it became much more severe during the August and September. Joe will initiate contact with people who might be able to assist the neighborhood in alleviating this problem.

Joe reported that Connie Colangelo had resigned from the board and that he was appointing Mary D'Alasandro to fill her term.

Meeting minutes – Dale made a motion to accept the minutes from the September board meeting. Peter seconded and the minutes were accepted.

Treasurer's report – Lyn gave the financial report, noting that membership is running less this year compared to last. Peter made a motion to accept the report. Elena seconded and it passed unanimously. Lyn reported that the cost for running the web site

has increased by \$200. Peter made a motion that the Association pay that. Mary seconded and it passed unanimously.

City Council – Dale reported that he is organizing volunteers to go to the bimonthly city council meetings to speak about Stockade events or concerns. He is keeping minutes on who spoke and about what, as well as the response, if any, from the city. Anyone with ideas to present or who wishes to volunteer should contact him.

Master Plan – Dale reported that about 20 people attended the Stockade meeting on September 29th and it went very well. He is working through the suggestions to organize them into the existing documents. The first Master Plan meeting with River Street Planning would be October 18. The second and third meetings will most likely be early in 2006.

Suggestions – Dale reported that he received zero reply from his request in the September *Spy* for suggestions from the general membership about neighborhood priorities.

Walkabout – Lyn reported approximately 3000 people attended the Walkabout and Waterfront Faire. Final ticket sales and profits were not yet available. She lauded the number of volunteers who helped out, especially those from outside the neighborhood who came and helped on that day.

Christmas – Peter reported that plans are continuing for a fabulous November 27th tree lighting.

February Brunch – Peter announced the date as February 16.

Dale made a motion to adjourn. Peter seconded and it passed unanimously. The meeting adjourned at 8:30.

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A Glorious Walkabout & Waterfront Faire!

It was the most perfect autumn day imaginable and the Walkabout and Waterfront Faire team was indeed ready! After last year's early morning down-pour, everyone was up at dawn this year, celebrating the bright blue heavens and delightful temperatures.

On a completely different note, it was the first year that our sponsors showed such confidence in

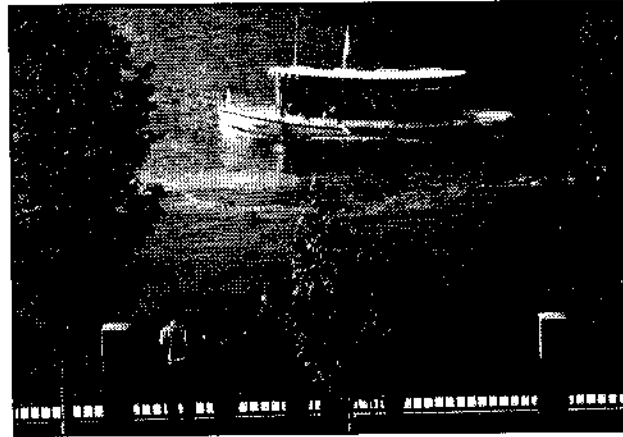

We want to thank all the many businesses, restaurants, and churches that were open and added special activities and touches in celebration of the day.

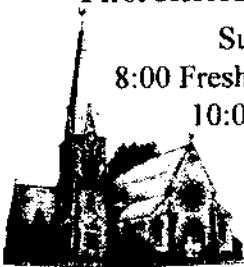
The Waterfront Faire looked beautiful and fun with banners waving at the

The Phantom on Front Street

There's a mysterious presence rising up from the sidewalk in the Stockade. The entity has been historically reported and witnessed by residents on every street in the neighborhood. Some claim it's only a legend. Others swear to have witnessed its awesome power. Its origin unknown, this strange object has entangled those who dare to saunter casually down Front Street. It has been said that espresso drinkers leaving the 1795 Café have stumbled upon it and been hurled by sheer force out into the path of unsuspecting sight-seers driving PT Cruisers.

What is this mysterious creature? Believers have deemed it a gnarled witch, bent on thwarting the pursuits of dedicated archeologists looking for splinters of the original Stockade timbers. Others support the theory that it is a failed experiment from some misguided GE engineer gone terribly awry. Historians suggest the monster may have evolved from the fertile soil of the Green Street Burial Plot.

Other theories about these strange creatures have been proposed as well.

One story currently circulating is that it escaped from a tree farm in Galway, NY, settled in the rich flood plain of the Mohawk River and rapidly reached gigantic proportions. Perhaps, the Erie Canal brought a seed, attached to a barge traveling from Buffalo, to its current location.

Another theory, proposed by the scholars at the Historical Society is that these creatures are avocado trees which have evolved from a "supposedly prehistoric family indigenous to California," a species that was highly successful in living in both "temperate and subtropical areas." On the other hand, they could have come from Asia during the Pleistocene era.

Other creative possibilities include linking these creatures to UFO sightings. It's been hinted that Lawrence the Indian may have inadvertently spawned the monstrosity by accidentally scattering seeds clung to his quiver as he relentlessly pursued the Indians and French after the 1690 raid.

Regardless of its origin, those whose families have lived in the Stockade for generations simply call the creature BIGROOT. New-comers refer to it Sassafrassquatch. Stockade and City Plan Update

On October 18th, Margaret Irwin of River Street Planning presided over the first of three meetings concerning the Stockade's portion of the city's comprehensive plan. About 35 residents attended the meeting. For the first half, Ms Irwin covered the history of comprehensive plans in Schenectady as well as how the Stockade neighborhood's demographics compare to others in the city. The most interesting nugget of data was that the Stockade accounts for 1.5% of the city's land but provides 3.4% of the city's taxes.


The second half of the meeting was a wide-ranging discussion of what needs to be improved in the Stockade, which included such topics as the conditions of streets, sidewalks and curbing, cut-through traffic, parking, speeding, traffic laws enforcement, code enforcement, excessive signage, street cleaning, inequitable property assessment, Riverside Park, communication with the city, burying utility lines, street lighting and pedestrian access to downtown. Many excellent ideas and comments were made and collected by River Street.

The second and third meetings will be held in January and February. During these meetings, Stockade residents will help craft and prioritize concrete solutions to be included in our section of the comprehensive plan. These meeting dates will be published in the *Spy* as soon as we know them. Additionally, Dale Miller will provide updates on the process during the November and January general meetings. Statuary and Symbolism Tour At Vale

The final tour in Vale Cemetery for this season will be on **Sunday, November 13th at 2:00 PM**. This tour will be devoted to Statuary and Symbolism. The Tour leader will be Christopher Hunter, archivist at the Schenectady Museum. Those interested in going on this tour should assemble at the Caretaker's House, 907 State Street. The tour will begin promptly at 2 PM and last about an hour to an hour and a half. Wear comfortable shoes and warm clothing! There is no charge but donations toward cemetery maintenance are most appreciated.

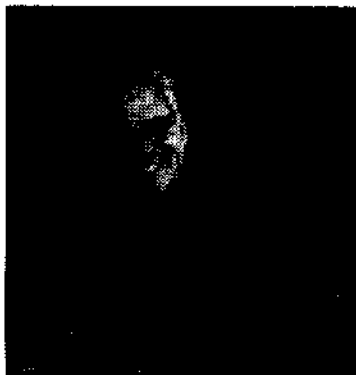
As for Statuary and Symbolism, Vale has an abundance of both. One of the more striking statues is referred to as "The Black Angel" around which there has grown up a number of stories that she watches over the cemetery. It's one of the Veeder memorials and over the years the metal from which it was fabricated oxidized to green and then to green and black. Yet another distinctive statue sits atop the memorial for the Ellis brothers, John and Charles, who were the founders of the American Locomotive Works (ALCO) - the statue is that of a commanding figure atop a column overlooking the Vale toward the locomotive works. These are prime examples of what is often referred to as Monumentalism and Dynasty Plots in Cemeteries - a central monument circled by smaller grave markers for family members.

At Vale Cemetery, examples of iconography are particularly interesting because of the age of some of the headstones. Vale opened in 1857 and in 1859 there was a major reinterment of the bodies and grave markers from the First Reformed Church Cemetery from its previous location on Green Street not far from Ferry Street. Around the same time there was also a reinterment to Vale Cemetery of members of the Van Guysling family which had been buried on Van Slyck Island in the Mohawk River. The earliest grave markers tended to be simple - and one or two are in Dutch including the one for Ian Meebie - but are very difficult to read today because of erosion of the material used for the markers. The iconography on these early colonial stones represents familiarity with death and the uncertainty of making it to heaven. There are a number of examples in the Dutch Reformed Cemetery Plot that feature icons such as winged skulls (dead heads) complete with crossed bones. Later examples in this area feature winged soul effigies - a less graphic depiction of a skull. Some icons are capped with a stylized tulip, the symbol of righteousness. By the mid 1800's one can detect angels, urns and weeping willows.

On the day before the tour on **Saturday, November 12th, 2005 at 1:00 PM** at the Schenectady Historical Society on Washington Avenue Dr. Bernard F. McEvoy, President of the Vale Cemetery Board of Trustees will give a talk on "Vale Cemetery - Past, Present & Future." This is an historic treasure in the heart of an industrial city. All of the birds that occur in and around the Stockade go through different changes in their different plumages. Most of the Warblers which pass through are a good example. In the spring migration they are of mostly bright coloration. In the fall their colors go from bright to mostly dull so that they blend in with the tropical vegetation on their wintering grounds. Male Scarlet Tanagers go from Bright Scarlet to olive green but they still retain the black wings and tail. Keep your eyes open for passing Geese.
