LETTER FROM OUR PRESIDENT 1661-1961

This is the year of the Tri Centenary. Since Arent Van Curler settled his band on the Right Bank of the Mohawk and established the Schenectady Stockade, three hundred years have passed. Today the Stockade Area is a small portion of the Schenectady Metropolis, yet its distinct position as founder and leader has not diminished through the centuries of growth. This venerated area which lies immediately west of Schenectady business district contains the original seventeenth century settlement laid out in the time of its founders and is one of the few communities in America where properties in close proximity to the central business district have been held in residential uses, where the descendants of the original settlers are still living, and where architecture of every historic American period is still to be seen.

Throughout America historic architecture in the urban scene has been subjected to a continuous process of

loss and deterioration. The art that is architecture cannot be collected in a gallery, but lives on in the museums of buildings and the people are their curators. The citizens of old areas are responsible for finding ways to safeguard, renew and bring historic architecture into living use in the contemporary world. If over a period of time, the best structures of the past can be saved and the poor ones replaced, the cities will become repositories of man's outstanding architectural achievements.

It is to this goal of preservation and progress that the Stockade Association and this publication, its official organ is dedicated. The Stockade Association stands for an active plan to safeguard the heritage of Schenectady by preserving a district which reflects elements of its cultural, social, economic, political and architectural history; to stabilize and improve the property values of our entire residential area from Erie Boulevard to the Binnie Kill, from State Street to the river; to check encroaching blight upon this area, to chart future growth, to strengthen the local economy through the building of needed modern housing and neighborhood facilities, to make good use of vacant lands, to ease traffic and parking situations, to foster civic beauty, to create a meaningful environment and to promote the use of this historic district for the education, pleasure and welfare of the people. Let us form a living expression of our founding father's ideal of the city beautiful.



Stockade Association Board Meeting Minutes Tuesday February 7, 2006

Present: Joe Fava, Mary D'Alessandro, Bob Briber, Gloria Kishton, Lyn Gordon, Fred Kindl, Dale Miller and Peter Rumora. Ellen Desmond, Frank Gilmore and Steve Kowalski were present as guests. Elena Alvarez, Diane DeMeo and Bob Preville had indicated they would be absent.

Joe called the meeting to order at 7:05 and introduced the visitors, who were there to discuss two items: extending **plumbing to the gardens of Riverside Park** and the May CleanUp Day. Ellen described six areas which could use a controllable faucet. Peter said the lilac bushes don't need watering; they survive by themselves. Gloria suggested that we think more broadly, should other locations become desirable in the future. Hope was expressed that the River Street Planning group's initiatives could lead to progress in the matter. It was agreed that the Garden Group would write a letter to the Mayor, indicating what they would like, and the Association would write in support.

Frank and the group wondered if we could make the Park CleanUp, scheduled for May 20, more of a community event, to elicit more volunteer effort. Perhaps it could be made into a "rite of spring" event, with Morris Dancers or other activities. Several suggestions were offered. Frank and Steve will discuss making more dumpsters available and related issues with Carl Olsen. The event could be promoted in the two remaining issues of the SPY; Bob suggested that Frank or others write text for the SPY.

The **sidewalks of the Stockade** were discussed. All agreed that Dale's map illustrating the condition of the sidewalks was a sterling first step. Peter commented that each sidewalk area is different,

Lily had emailed several members her promised initial statement about the "Infrastructure Committee" and Frank and Peter agreed they would continue working with her. Dale said he would be happy to help [but he wanted no more committee meetings.] Lily reported in her email that she had talked with the area Grant Manager of the NYS Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation Office, who had said we can apply for funds in March. She said she and her committee would be meeting with City officials soon.

The minutes of the meeting of January 3 were approved, as was the Treasurer's report. Lyn reported that she had bought a \$5000 CD as approved by the Board, and recorded \$2746.96 in additional expenses in January, and \$580 in income.

Dale distributed an excellent map, drawn from reports by Board members, about plaques in the neighborhood. Seventy of the 350 buildings in the Stockade have historic plaques. Dale indicated several sets of prices for plaques and hopes to have a complete report for the May meeting of the Association, incorporating the Historical Society's input and suggestions for enlarging the program.

Fred brought up the March 9 meeting. He said again the purpose is to get neighbors to identify projects they would like the Association to do. The goal at the meeting is to elicit ideas, without debate, and then later on to prioritize them. He said he would like two people, each with a flip chart and magic marker, to record the ideas.

Gloria reported on the work of the Heritage board, which met the previous week. She said they are working on the "Livable Cities" program, and had meet with the Mayor's office to continue pursuing City

efforts to take action against demolition by neglect. She said that the owner understands that to get the substantial financial support available to renovate 221 Green St., he has to have clear title and pay taxes. Gloria said he had paid up to this year's taxes.

Gloria also reported that she and her neighbor had periodically had someone deposit bags of garbage on her front step. After discussion, Gloria agreed to get a quotation on the cost of a motion-activated camera, to try to identify the perpetrator.

The group discussed the continuing issue of the YMCA. Gloria said she has gotten volunteers who want to work on the issue. The YM collects some \$28,000,000 a year from various sources to support their programs, including housing. Joe agreed to be the "point man" for the issue, which all present needs to be handled thoughtfully. He has sent a letter to legislators which Dale said he would put on the Stockade's Yahoo! site.

Peter pointed out that Rob Gavel has been paying for the lights on Lawrence since he started the 1795 Café. It was moved, seconded and passed [MSP] that we give the 1795 Cafe \$100 to cover his continuing electricity expenses.

Gloria reported that a neighbor had been struck by a car in front of the Van Dyck and that she and others had tried to console and help her. Based on this event - and the continuing concern expressed for years by the Board — Dale moved and it was MSP that "The Board of the Stockade Association feel the speed limit in the Stockade should be 20 mph." Though the City has not so far seen fit to change our speed limits, we can at least indicate what the Association wants.

Lyn reminded the group that Annetta August had applied for \$450 in sidewalk and painting incentives, and the subject was discussed at length. Annetta had not been a member of the Association when she applied, and the conditions of the grant require membership. It was MSP (by 6 positive votes, one negative and one abstention] that we oppose the grant.



Reprinted From the January 1996 Stockade Spy:

The beginning of a new year is always exciting but this one is special: January 1996 we celebrate the STOCKADE SPY's 35th birthday. Back in 1961 the Association was a four year old infant. The neighborhood was re-awakening. The SPY was born, the brainchild of Association president Jim Schmitt, who also acted as president. Barrie Covert was Editor and Werner Feibes, as Art Director, designed its now famous mast-head. It was printed on legal size stationery in green ink on the old mimeograph machine at the State Street office of Van der Bogert, Feibes & Schmitt Architects.

By its third issue in March 1961, in fast growing SPY expanded to its present format (in 1996 it was an 11" x 14 1/2" size page), in black ink, printed by a professional printer; Feibes suitably expanded the masthead by adding three more historic homes. "Tidings" was initiated by Dorothy Landon, and Giles Van der Bogert had begun his series "Walls Have Ears"* illustrated by Feibes.

A March 1961 guest editorial was reprinted from the Scotia-Glenville Journal, titled "Bouquet;" it read in part: "Not many years ago the Stockade Area was rundown and attractive only to those tenants looking for cheap rent. Then a group of people with imagination as well as dollar sense saw the area as it had been, once in its history, and went to work with colors and a use of the architecture already under their noses. Anyone who has been around there recently knows what has happened to real estate values in that 'village'."

What a timely reminder of the treasure we have in the Stockade "village" and in the 35 year old SPY. HAPPY BIRTHDAY!



From One Historic Area to Another - Priscilla (Harlow) Gocha

My Dad, H. Gilbert Harlow, was born in Plymouth, Ma. in 1914. He lived there until attending college at Tufts University. Part of my Dad's heritage was a small gambrel house which dates back to the 1600's when Sqt. William Harlow resided there. The house is at 119 Sandwich Street and is in need of extensive restoration. My Dad's father, Elmer Randall Harlow, was the last family member born there in the 1800's. The Harlow House then became a museum open to generations of local children learning about New England's beginnings. All Harlow "Cousins" who are members of the Harlow Association are part of a fundraiser to save the building. The archaeological exploration has just been completed and the restoration is moving forward. Our family always spent Thanksgiving Day in Plymouth while marching in Pilgrim's Progress and always a stop at the Harlow House for cider and donuts.

In 1941 my Dad purchased the Governor Yates home on Front Street and he is still living there at age 92. The house had been badly neglected and empty for four years. After much work on the house and four terraced gardens with swimming pool, he opened the residence as a home for 36 GE engineers as well as his family of five children. It remained this way until the early 60's when Paul Schaefer restored the house to 6 apartments and that is how it remains today.

A large and important part of my Dad's life has been his involvement in the restoration of these important homes.





Black-throated Green Warbler

The advent of the breeding season in spring is heralded each dawn by a chorus of bird song that continues intermittently throughout the day. With practice, we can identify a species by its songs and calls even without seeing the vocalizer, and we infer that birds can similarly distinguish between members of their own and other species by voice alone. For example, some Black-throated Green Warblers sing the following: zoo-zee, zoo-zoo zee, while others do zee, zee, zee zee, zoo-zee. I've heard both variations, but I've heard one go zoo, zee warble, warble, warble, zee south of Bath, Maine.
