Secret Gardens Tour June 23 & 24 - Ellen Desmond

The 4th "Secret Gardens of the Stockade" tour, sponsored by the Stockade Garden Group, promises delight once again this year, a chance to explore ten rarely seen, largely hidden private garden spaces and 6 public gardens and points of interest within Schenectady's oldest neighborhood.

Welcome to the gardens of Schenectady's historic Stockade, whose homes, cradled by the arms of the Binnekill and the Mohawk River, date from the late 1600's through the late Victorian era. Stockade residents, privileged to be the caretakers of these wonderful historic properties, invite you to share the joy of gardening within their treasured "secret" gardens.

Come, bring a friend. Explore gardens descending the river banks, opening onto parkland, two neighboring gardens, a garden of ephemera and plantings, in a style set for a wedding, with trellises and climbing roses. See the 7 sisters in bloom. See new water features and a small space garden in process. Experience hidden courtyards, winding paths, intimate spaces, the flow of peace and serenity. Find the oldest Ginko tree in New York and the 3 sisters.

Tour the public spaces as well. Walking along the river through Riverside Park, enjoy the gardens at the Washington Avenue entrance, the mixed lilac and rose beds along the way, and the garden as you exit Ingersoll Avenue. Visit the garden surrounding Lawrence's statue where Front, Ferry and Green Streets meet. Spend the day if you wish. Enjoy sitting in the park, further exploring the neighborhood, noticing the many young street trees as you go, and eating at one of the many restaurants within or surrounding the Stockade.

Tickets are \$15.00 per person pre-purchased, and \$20 if purchased on either tour day. To reserve your tickets, call 346-5735 or 374-3854.

The tour will take place, rain or shine, Friday, June 23 from 3-8 PM and Saturday, June 24 from 10 AM to 4 PM.

Proceeds from past tours have been used to plant over 100 trees in the Stockade, with the help of Re-Tree Schenectady, to develop and maintain the Riverside Park and Lawrence public gardens, for park planters and for Stoop awards, an incentive program with prizes given to residents for winning doorway, porch or front of house plantings. 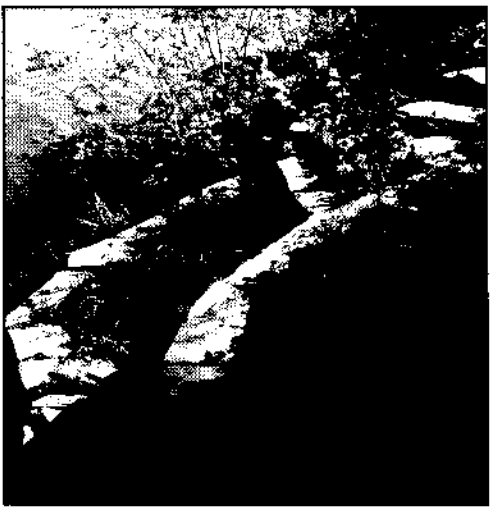

Stockade Association Board Meeting Minutes Tuesday April 4, 2006 at the Schenectady County Historical Society

Present: Joe Fava, Bob Briber, Mary D'Alessandro, Diane DeMeo, Lyn Gordon, Fred Kindl, Gloria Kishton, Dale Miller, Bob Preville and Peter Rumora. Lily Alvarez had asked to be excused but submitted a memorandum with insight into grant sources and procedures. Sylvie Briber, Editor of the SPY, Vince DiSerbo, Ray Gillen, Frank Gilmore, Doug Sayles and Wayne Senecal were present for a brief, informal discussion before the meeting.

Joe called the meeting to order at 7 pm. The minutes were approved as distributed; Lyn Gordon's Treasurer's report, which showed operating expenses of \$171.36 and income of \$255 since the last Stockade meeting, was accepted.

Peter described a meeting he, Joe and Dale had with Carl Olsen regarding sidewalks. Carl said that a homeowner who wants new sidewalks can install them at their own expense and the City will put in curbs. Carl, incidentally, said he could install curbs without disturbing sidewalks. The City will also reserve trees if a homeowner wants to replace them. The group talked about sidewalks - a complex subject with homeowners often wanting different solutions to their own sidewalks.

Joe said the question is "what do we want for the Stockade?" Sidewalk improvement was a high priority among voters at the recent general meeting. Burying utilities, to remove the forest of poles and overhead wires, has also been a goal. After discussion the group agreed that we need a planning grant to help us study and understand the requirements. Lily had asked in her memo to the Board that we express

our desires formally, so it was MSP "The Board of the Stockade Association approves an approach to appropriate authorities for planning grant money to develop a plan for renovating sidewalks and utility distribution in the Stockade." Mary said that she felt that Frank Gilmore would also have ideas about funding sources.

Peter raised the issue of a **parking permit for the Stockade**, which many favor, and described a program that had been in effect in Albany. He has developed a plan for the Stockade which he showed to Carl Olsen. Joe said he would ask Carl about it.

Next, Dale described the status of **house plaques**. Gloria had developed three possible logos and after discussion the group selected one. Gloria will discuss specific design requirements with the foundry. Dale, after talking with Don Rittner about the design and related issues, plans to put the design on the Stockade Yahoo site for consideration. Dale said that the County has a grant program to support historical values in Schenectady, with grant amounts between \$1000 and \$3000; he will apply for the larger amount with the idea of helping homeowners pay for their plaque. Joe said he would talk with Susan Savage about the program.

Gloria reported on **Heritage Foundation**. National Historic Preservation Month activities include Annual Preservation Awards and party (5/19), walking tour of Vale Cemetery (5/20), Livable Cities lecture by Mr. Gardner, Mayor of St. Augustine, FL (5/21) and other walking tours and activities. SHF is working on an initiative to incorporate into the local Stockade Historic District properties not initially included and those later gerrymandered out, and to expand the boundaries of the District. They are also working on funding structural reports for two endangered

Historic properties, the South Church Street firehouse and the Silver Diner. Plans for a December fundraiser are being considered.

The group discussed the **vote tally from the general meeting on March 9**. A co-op grocery store was first choice; sentiment was expressed that what people really want is a place to shop for groceries. A food co-op is an enormous amount of work. Lyn pointed out that the two topics, "**Preservation/Code Enforcement**" and "**Deteriorating Properties**" together received more votes than "co-op grocery," and they together are a long-term function of the Association. Joe described the efforts several years ago where a committee identified deteriorating properties and called the owner's attention to the problems. If no action was taken, the City code enforcement office could take action and charge the homeowner. He said we need a code enforcement committee to pick up that effort.

Lyn & Don are working on the Sch'dy Heritage Foundation initiative to **extend the boundaries of the Stockade** to its original footprint. Joe said he had talked with Bill Hickman about presenting "The Love Letters of John and Abigail Adams" at the **Walkabout** and if details can be worked out, will want Board members to sell tickets.

Joe said that Jennifer Wells is on top of the **Park CleanUp** on May 20, It was suggested that the publicity focus be a little broader than just the Park; for example, "Let's CleanUp our Neighborhood." Diane reported that mailings to vendors for **Kerst Kermis** are going out, and while they haven't decided yet' where to hold the event, she and Joe will discuss it. Joe said he would do the **Sidewalk Sale** on June 3. Sylvie said that **50th anniversary of the Stockade Association is 2007**. She asked

that this be mentioned at the next general meeting. The Stockade will also become an important part of the 350th anniversary of the City. (One wag suggested that, that year, we display 350 Christmas trees.) Lyn said the **Nominating Committee** has 3 vacancies, and is looking for additional names. The group discussed the **YWCA's plans for the Mary Hill house**; one issue seems to be that the city is reported to have a moratorium on cutting existing buildings into apartments. The **general meeting of May 11** was discussed. Two subjects may consume the agenda: The status of the YMCA and the Mary Hill house project at the YWCA. Gloria also suggested the **bike-path** be discussed, but Joe said that planning will be months in being formalized and probably deserves a meeting devoted to the subject.

The next meeting of the Board is May 2. Peter identified one important issue, **the budget of the Association**. Just how do we want to handle it? He said Lyn works very hard to manage the budget we approved, and to keep our expenses in line, and the Board ignores the budget freely.

May is National Historic Preservation Month

Schenectady Heritage Foundation announces the following events to celebrate:

Schenectady Heritage Foundation Annual **Preservation Awards** will be presented on Friday, May 19 at noon in the rotunda of Schenectady City Hall. Later that evening, a celebration honoring the recipients will be held at the Schenectady County Historical Society.

Livable Cities, a speaker series begun by the Foundation in 1999, will present a panel discussion focusing on Heritage Tourism on Monday, May 15 at 7pm. Panelists will include County Historian Don Rittner, Dr. Charles Gehring, Director of the New Netherlands Institute, and Councilwoman Barbara Blanchard. The discussion will take place in the McChesney Room of the Schenectady County Public Library - main branch.

A lecture focusing on **Heritage Tourism** will be presented by George Gardner, Mayor of St. Augustine, Florida, Sunday, May 21, at 3pm at historic St. Joseph's Church, Lafayette St. at State St., Schenectady, with a dinner to follow at the Parker Inn. Mayor Gardner is tied to the area through relatives. He was born into a political family, and first elected mayor on the 90th anniversary of his grandfather's election as mayor of Schenectady - four-term Mayor George R. Lunn. His father, Carroll "Pink" Gardner, was elected to eleven consecutive terms as Schenectady County Clerk. Mayor Gardner serves a city of 13,000 with more than three million heritage tourism visitors annually.

Several walking tours are scheduled; watch for publicity about these events.

You may need to file an application

If you are planning outside repairs and painting, **including those that are identical to what was there before**, you may need to file an application. Any repairs, painting, or sidewalk replacement **seen from the public right of way** must have approval from the Schenectady Historic Commission. Applications, full deadline and meeting schedule, and further information are available from Christine Slovak, 382-5147, or Tony Tozzi, 382-5054 in the Department of Development, Room 14, 105 Jay Street, City Hall, Schenectady, 12305. Fees for Historic Commission applications are \$10 for residential applications and \$20 for commercial applications. 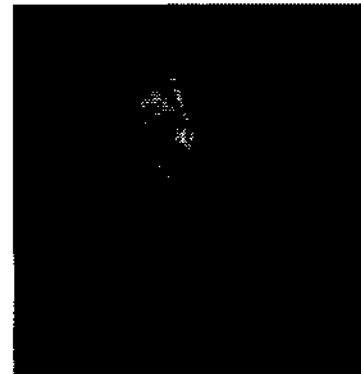

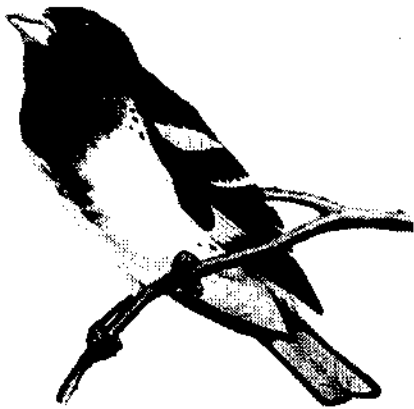

Birds of the Stockade

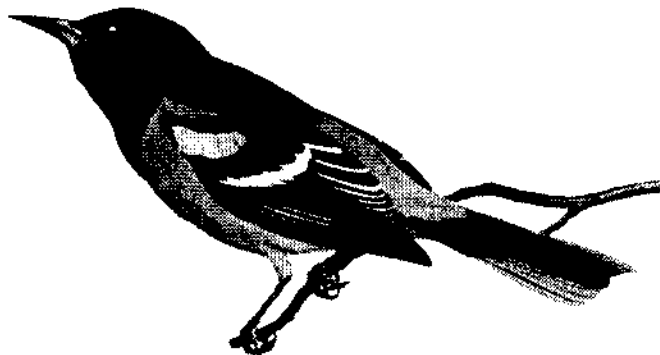


Rose-breasted Grosbeak

With the spring migration underway, new species are arriving every day. Some will stay while others are passing through. Most of the warblers that pass through have colorful names such as Blackburnian, Bay-breasted, Black-throated Blue, Magnolia, American Redstart, and Northern Parula. Some of the birds to keep your eyes and ears open for are the Rose-breasted Grosbeak and Baltimore Oriole. The Grosbeak's song is a slow, whistled warble, robinlike but slightly husky quality, without gurgling notes; the pace is steady and slow. The call is a sharp lik, like a rusty gate or sneakers on a gym floor. The Oriole's song is a short series of rich, clear, whistled notes, pidoo tewdi tewdi yewdi tew tidew; variable in pattern, with pauses between each phrase; often gives simple two-note whistle hulee and variations. The call is a dry, harsh, uneven rattle. The female Oriole and Grosbeak also sing as do North Cardinals, Purple Finches and Scarlet Tanagers.

Keep your eyes open for Tree Swallows.

A Story of Two Houses

Five years ago, Thomas Killeen bought two neighboring houses in the Stockade Historic District, 223 and 221 Green Street, from the estate of John Bradshaw. Kudos to Mr. Killeen for restoring his property at 223 Green Street and to Harold Schneiderwind, a neighbor and historic structures consultant, for securing investment tax credits for Mr. Killeen (*Stockade Spy*, Vol. 47, No. 8, April 2006).

A bit of history: the current house at 221 Green Street was built c. 1850 next to what was then the old Dutch cemetery. In the late 1800's, these early graves were moved to Vale Cemetery, making room for the construction of the brick house at 223 Green Street. Walking by these two neighboring houses today, we see that 221 is an earlier, Federal style, while 223 is a Victorian style, described so well by Mr. Schneiderwind in his *Spy* article last month. The 221 house was the home of Jacob Clute, who probably walked to work at the foundry he and his brother owned on Liberty Street, near the Erie Canal (today's Erie Boulevard). One of their major contributions to the history of our country was the manufacturing of the turret assembly for the Civil War iron clad ship, *Monitor*. This unique assembly was instrumental in winning the famous naval battle with the Confederate ship, *Merrimac*. The craftsmanship of the Clute Brothers greatly influenced the outcome of this Civil War battle.

Our county historian, Don Rittner, has seen evidence suggesting that the stone foundation of the Clute House may predate the Schenectady Massacre. Early settlers may have constructed such stone buildings as storage warehouses outside of the actual stockade walls. After the massacre, Don thinks they may have built upon the ruined stone foundations in the Stockade Historic District. Don has seen evidence of this type of early Dutch style stone wall in only a few other Schenectady buildings.

A bit of recent history: In 2002, Mr. Killeen requested permission from Schenectady's Historic District Commission to demolish 221 Green Street.

The Commission denied his request due to the historic significance of the house, stating that it is "worthy of being preserved." Mr. Killeen contested this decision at the Board of Zoning Appeals, which agreed with the Historic District Commission and also denied his appeal. Since owning it, Mr. Killeen has gutted the house and done several repairs, but its condition is still very much endangered. Last year, Mr. Killeen changed the deed for 223 Green Street, granting it an easement across the skewed property line separating the two parcels in order to ensure access to parking in the backyard. The Schenectady Heritage Foundation has been encouraging Mr. Killeen to restore the Clute House since he purchased it in 1999. In fact, the Foundation developed an incentive program specifically for the restoration of the Clute House and has offered Mr. Killeen (or a different owner, if he sells the house) a \$25,000 grant and a \$40,000, low-interest loan to help restore his house. The Stockade Association has also offered assistance.

In his article, Mr. Schneiderwind describes Tom Killeen as a "restorationist" with a "great feel for how an old building should be preserved." We agree, which is why we anticipate Mr. Killeen will restore 221 Green Street with the same level of quality and care that he showed in restoring 223 Green Street. We also trust he will grant the same easement to ensure parking access in its backyard. The Schenectady Heritage Foundation looks forward to the restoration of this house with great anticipation, as do many Stockade neighbors and preservationists. Mr. Killeen should proceed full-speed-ahead with the restoration of the historic Clute House at 221 Green Street now that its neighbor at 223 Green Street has been restored so beautifully, and the construction season is upon us. May the little Federal house with a big history soon stand proudly along with Mr. Killeen on its block of Green Street.


