2007 - 50 Year Anniversary of Stockade Association

It was on that wonderful night of September 18, 1957 that a group of "representatives of Land Owners of Down Town Schenectady" met at Mr. and Mrs. Bryan Shanklin's house, 109 Union Street at 8:00 o'clock. The meeting was called to order with Giles Y. van der Bogert acting as temporary Chairman, Mary van der Bogert acting as temporary secretary.

Present at the meeting, and later to be known as the sixteen founders, were:

Lavinia Shanklin, Katy Blodgett, Elizabeth Joyce, Ellsworth and Dorothy Langdon, Gertrude Naylor, Jim Gilliland, Alice and Nick Colangelo, Ann and Bob George, John Bradbury, Bill Quinn, Mary and Giles van der Bogert and Jim Schmitt.

It was moved and approved that the area to be represented include:

Green Street from the Indian to College Street; Front Street from Washington Avenue to Ingersoll Avenue; Union Street from Washington Avenue to College Street, Washington Avenue from The River to State Street; Church Street from Front Street to Liberty Street; Ferry Street from The River to Liberty Street; Ingersoll Avenue from Front Street to the River; North Street from Front

Street to the River; Governors Lane from Front Street to the River; and Cucumber Alley from Washington Avenue to the River.

It was suggested that representation will be by:

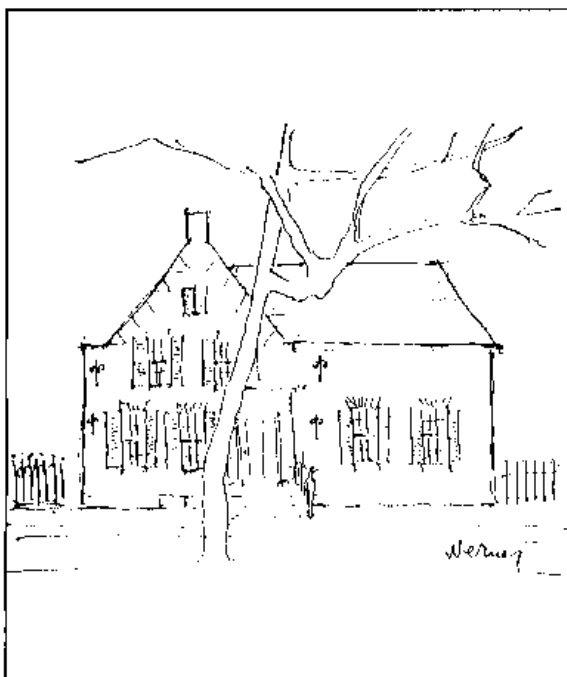
Owner of Land as voting members, and Tenants as associate members.

The General Purpose of the Group was thought to be:

- 1) To protect and improve the area by:
 - a) Encouraging replanting of trees, and preservation of present trees by Land Owners.
 - b) Reporting overcrowding and unhealthy conditions.
 - c) Preserving Zoning Laws.
 - d) Investigating possibility of having wires run underground rather than cutting trees by Power Company.
 - e) Promoting clean sidewalks.
 - f) To request street cleaning service once a week with cars moved off street.
 - g) Representation at City Council and Zoning Board meetings.

The following appointments were made to carry out a "Plan of Action."

- 1) Mr. Ellsworth Langdon appointed Chairman to set up constitution and by-laws.
- 2) Mrs. Bryan Shanklin, *(continued on page 2)*



Stockade Association Board Meeting December 5, 2006 Summary

Carol DeLaMarter took notes in Dave Lowry's absence. Board Members Present: Joe Fava, Dale Miller, Lyn Gordon, Mary, D'Alessandro, Peter Rumora, Diane DeMeo, Beverly Elander, Carol DeLaMarter, Gloria Kishton. Board Members not Present: John Samatulski, David Lowry. Guests of the Board: Sylvie Briber, Editor of *Spy*

No minutes were available for review from November Board or General meeting. Board approved the treasurer's report that included \$460 revenue from membership fees and \$60 from *Spy* subscriptions. Expenses: Park cleanup \$150, Kerst Kermis carriage \$100, Christmas \$232 and *Spy* expenses of \$971.17.

Diane DeMeo reported on 12/3 Kerst Kermis. Net proceeds from brunches, vendors and sponsors exceeded \$1500. Board felt event has potential to be winter event like the Walkabout as a money raiser and discussed lots of ideas to expand this but will need more volunteers and another venue for vendors.

Board thanked Peter Rumora and his volunteers for successful and festive Tree lighting event. Board thought new venue of Arthur's and music added to festivities. While no official count thought 200

attended and well covered by the *Gazette*. Would like to see several Town Criers added next year.

Sylvie Briber reported on ways to improve *Spy* distribution including mailing. This will be further investigated and presented at next Association meeting.

February Brunch is being planned for February 11 at Civic Playhouse. Board members got their assignments.

Dale Miller submitted a revised Stockade Association logo for which was approved by the board - the revision was very minor, concerning the dimensions of one of the windows. The logo will be used on approved Association projects, such as historic plaques and streetsigns. The application for house plaques has been revised by the Historical Society and is ready. The Stockade Association has made \$1500 available to homeowners to offset part of the cost of new plaques. Gloria Kishton will give a year in review at the January 11 Association General Meeting including an update on the Green Street property.

Board members also received updates on repair to fencing at Lawrence, repair of Community Bulletin board. Mary Hill House committee will meet and report prior to the next General membership meeting.

Stockade to Publish Neighborhood Cookbook

About five years ago, there was a plan to publish a Stockade cookbook. Although the cookbook was never written, the idea lay fallow until it reached the fertile minds of Stockade residents Joan Bassarab, Lydia Eis, Jennifer Wells, and Beverly Elander.

Over the next 12 months, this group, under the auspices of the Stockade Board Association, expects to collect recipes with their histories, publish a Stockade cookbook, and sell it in various neighborhood locations like Arthur's Market and Cafe, and St. George's Gift Shop. Residents will be invited to submit their recipes (with a brief history of the recipe, and possibly a photo or sketch of their home) on a standard form via a number of convenient methods: the Stockade website (www.HistoricStockade.com), the Yahoo email list, and regular mail to list a few.

More details will follow in the February issue of the *Spy*, but in the meantime, here is a cookie recipe to start off the New Year with pizzazz and to get the culinary ball rolling (this recipe can also currently be found with others on the Stockade website).

Spicy Oatmeal Crisps

—adapted by Beverly Elander

"Pepper may sound like an odd ingredient for a cookie, but it complements the other spices well (although you can omit it if you prefer).

3/4 cup all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon ground allspice
1/2 teaspoon grated whole nutmeg
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper (optional)
1 cup packed brown sugar
5 tablespoons butter or stick margarine, softened
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 large egg
1/2 cup regular oats
Cooking spray

Preheat oven to 350°. Lightly spoon flour into dry measuring cups; level with a knife. Combine flour and next 7 ingredients (flour through pepper) in a medium bowl. Beat sugar, butter, and vanilla in a large bowl with a mixer at medium speed until light and fluffy. Add egg; beat well. Stir in flour mixture and oats. Drop by level tablespoons 2 inches apart onto baking sheets coated with cooking spray. Bake at 350° for 12 minutes or until crisp. Cool on pan 2 to 3 minutes or until firm. Remove cookies from pan; cool on wire racks.

Yield: 2 dozen cookies


(NOTE: This recipe originally came from AOL FOOD. I have modified it as follows: 1) I use white pepper instead of black 2) I also add 1/2 t. ground cardamom (in honor of my Scandinavian heritage), 1/2 c. chopped walnuts, and 1/2 c. golden raisins.)

“Why Schenectady?” is Good for Stockade

Schenectady's Public Access Channel (SACCTV-16) had the first of what they hope to be an annual film festival called “Why Schenectady?” featuring documentaries on the history or story of some person, institution, place of natural beauty, sports legend, work of architecture, event, invention or the like that is directly related to the city or towns of Schenectady County. The competition offered two categories: long (20+minutes) and short (5-20min.), with total cash prizes totaling close to \$2000. This year's festival took place on December 2nd at Union College; however, the station has already talked to Proctor's about being the home to future festivals.

Films of particular interest to Stockadians include: a film by Stockade resident Katherine Delain “**An Afternoon with Joseph Yates**,” in which she has an informative conversation with the former governor at a recent Stockade Walkabout and ends with random videography of some of the day's pleasures; another film “**The Old Courthouse**” by SHS Senior, Gordon Hendrick, gives the history of both the many changes of use and the innovative architectural design of the grand building with the enormous columns on Union Street; and finally, “**The Era of Erie: A Day to Remember**” by Stephen Drew takes the viewer on a ride from Buffalo through our area to Waterford on a historic ship built especially for the canal.

SACCTV-16 has set aside time in January, every Tuesday starting at 10pm, to show several of the winners and honorable mentions in both categories. The films of particular interest to the Stockade are scheduled as such: “Afternoon with Joseph Yates” Jan. 16th; “The Old Courthouse” Jan. 2nd & 16th; and “The Era of Erie” Jan. 9th.

Many of you will want to watch some of the other entries which include: “1954: A Year of Champions;” “Tea Cups and Dragons, Cabbages and Kings;” “West Glenville: A Post Foliage Videography;” “YWCA: Our Voice;” “Just Off Broadway! A Story of Proctor's Theatre;” and “Feel the Breeze.” Remember: Tuesdays starting at 10pm!

An event like this not only gives filmmakers a chance to compete for prizes and viewers interesting programming, it helps the overall effort by many area people and organizations to lift Schenectady out of its “Post-Industrial Depression” and into the blissful financial state other cities enjoy pursuing Historic/Scenic Tourism along with Urban Revitalization. 

Mary and I buried our beloved "Jakie's" ashes Sunday afternoon under a rock in our garden. Mr. Jake had loved his last years with us and his mate Emily at 7 Washington Avenue. He was not quite 10 when he peacefully and suddenly slipped away at home on November 18. Years before we had gotten each baby Golden "heart mender," at different times, after the deaths of Mary's earlier Golden's.

Jaker and Emily were inseparable, each vying for our affection. They would stage mock battles in the entry hall with furious growls and yelps (for dramatic effect). When Riverside Park was empty, we would let them chase a soft Frisbee. Our Jake would try to look fierce and go into a frozen crouch some 50 feet away; wait for the Frisbee to define its flight path; and race to where it would, or should have landed. Emily always rewarded his skillful fetches by stampeding into him and ripping his catch out of his mouth. Jake's wisdom and generous spirit allowed Emily to think she was the Alpha Dog, but he was really our powerful "lion." When Emily became bored with this game he would pick up the Frisbee and prance happily home, stopping every twenty yards or so to see if we were following,

Because we talked to him a lot as a puppy, and because he was, without question, the world's smartest dog, Jakie knew many words and even understood simple sentence structure. He also invented games to amuse himself and Emily. His "Chase the Tail" defied gravity...he always came up with a mouthful of his or Emily's "feathers."

Jake was the happiest, most loving spirit we've ever known. Mary, Emily and I will miss him always.

Legislature Honors

Former Stockade Association President and American Hero

On November 14, our County Legislature passed a resolution honoring Lt. Col. James Sherwood for his service to both his country and to his community. Lt. Col. Sherwood graduated from the US Naval Academy in 1944 and was a Marine platoon commander during the invasion of Okinawa where he was wounded. In China, he served on the Staff of Admiral Willard Kitts whose daughter was to become Suzanna Kitts Sherwood. During the Korean War, Lt. Col. Sherwood commanded a tank company and received 2 Bronze Stars for bravery, a letter of commendation from the Turkish government and a Distinguished Unit Citation.

In our community, Jim Sherwood served as a vestryman and acolyte at St. George's, as president

of the Linton High School PTA and as president of the Stockade Association. In 2000, Jim and Susanna Sherwood received the Schenectady Heritage Foundation Award for Outstanding Contribution to Historic Preservation in recognition of their work on behalf of the Widow Bohanan House (1815) and the Adolf Van De Moor House (1872).

Lt. Col James Sherwood died on June 25, 2005


Barbara and I were privileged to call Jim Sherwood a dear friend for more than 35 years. As noted by the County Legislature, Jim Sherwood was a community activist and a veteran... but he was also a hero and a gentleman. We miss him and his wise counsel.

IN HISTORIC SCHENECTADY



Ruscitto Family Reunion 1917

As I was surfing the web, which I find myself doing for many hours, working on my family tree, I came across a dissertation submitted to the State University of New York at Albany by Robert R. Pascucci: "Electric City Immigrants Italians and Poles of Schenectady, NY 1880-1930." This paper is posted on the Schenectady Digital History Archive, www.schenectadyhistory.org/resources/pascucciindex.html

I often wondered what East Front St. was like when my great grand parents settled here. My great grandfather, Nicola Ruscitto, came to America June 15, 1901 aboard the Nord America that departed from Naples, Italy. The manifest from Ellis Island shows that Nicola was 22 years old and single, (I believe that his first wife, Tullia Pizulo, passed away in Italy), and it also showed Nicola was a carpenter and he had \$20 in his pocket. He was going to see his brother Giuseppe in Schenectady, NY who lived at 8 1/2 Jefferson Street.

Nicola (my great grandfather) and Christina (Listorti) lived at 210 Front St. with their son Achille and his wife, Carmela. His daughter Tullia (Ruscitto) Villano lived at 214 Front St. Gaetano and Carmela Ruscitto lived at 205 Front St.

Around 1902 a group of Italian immigrants (Nicola was one of them) wanted to establish a church in which their growing Italian Community could worship. They sent for an Italian priest and founded St. Anthony's Church, at the corner of Nott St. and Seward Place. In 2002 St. Anthony's Church celebrated 100 years and is still a vibrant and growing parish.

My descendants gathered often for family parties and picnics. Music was a big part of their lives. Marching bands would go down Front St. and through

the City and they would love to watch. At gatherings, there was always someone ready to play the mandolin or guitar.

The above picture is a gathering from around 1917-1918 with all the living descendants at that time. The reunion was held at Dente Hall. The building was located at the corner of Front St. and River St. It is something to see how my family has grown. As of 2006 there are 658 names on the family tree and I am sure more need to be added! The family tree is 14 ft. long when printed out!

In the 1930 census, it shows Achille and his wife Carmela living at 210 Front St. (this is now the parking lot for BL's Tavern). Achille and his wife were 28 years old and Achille was a salesman who sold fruits and vegetables. The 1915 City Directory shows that my great grandfather Nicola had a grocery store at 210 Front St.

According to Dr. Pascucci's article, the decade of the 1880's closed with the two immigrant groups similar in size. The count in the City of Schenectady contained 221 Italian and 196 Polish foreign-born residents. By 1899, the Italian population had stagnated and the Polish continued to grow.

The City's growing need for laborers were satisfied largely by immigrants. Large scale Polish immigration to Schenectady extend from 1890 to 1910, with the peak of 4,315 foreign-born Poles was reached in 1900, while the City Foreign-born Italians increased 174.7 %. In 1900 Italian immigration groups numbered 5,387 and the Poles numbered 4,316. In 1930 Schenectady had 5,910 Italians and 3,648 Poles.

Italians settled downtown, primarily in the Third Ward (East Front St.) 3/4 of the Italian population in 1899 lived in workers' housing that had been built largely by the locomotive company in 1848. Almost 80% had an address in the Third Ward. Most lodged in the Front, Monroe, Jefferson and John St. areas.

The article tells how there was a varnish factory on River St. where 177 individuals were "herded together" and how families struggled to survive on a father's salary of seventy to eighty cents a day. It tells that in the 1900's male boarders were found in 20% of all Polish households, and Italian boarders were a part of almost half of all Italian families. This could explain why there were so many tenement houses in our area. These tenement houses were similar in style to Uncle Ben's, BL's and the rehab house located at the corner of Front and River St. The apartments did not have hot water and the bathrooms were located in the halls and were shared by all.

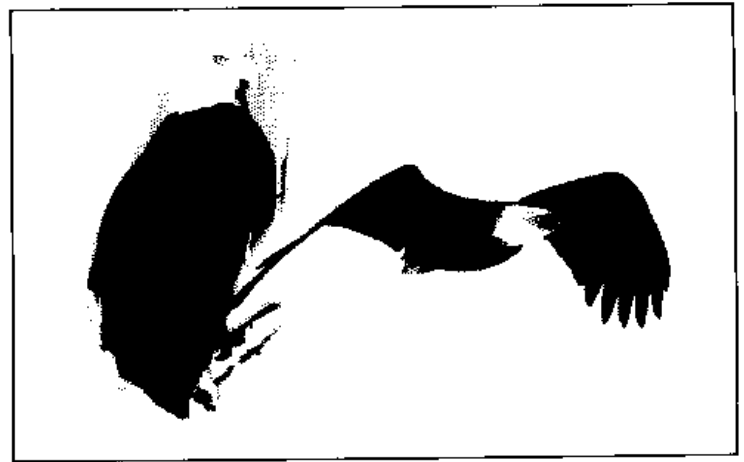
As I continued to read this article, it gave me an insight of how our families struggled to survive. It tells how hard it was being in a new country and living through the depression. By reading this paper I can understand why people who did not live in our neighborhood often would form the impression that our area was dangerous and poor. What they do not realize is that these immigrants were strong hard working, family oriented people who were determined to make a new life in a new country. Because of this the new generations are proud of the struggles and conditions that our ancestors had to endure and vow to make (which is happening!) our area a growing and prosperous neighborhood.

Quite often I run into people whose families lived in the East Front neighborhood or who grew up in the neighborhood, reminiscing about the old days. They say that they are just driving through the old neighborhood and they can notice the changes and how nice the area looks!

It is hard to put into words, how our neighborhood was when my father's family was growing up. I know that everyone was family. If someone was sick or their children were sick, or if someone needed work done on their house, everyone would pitch in to help them get through their hard times.

I urge everyone to read Dr. Pascucci's paper, and see how our neighborhood was a stepping stone in the City of Schenectady's history and how 80% of the immigrants that settled in Schenectady, stepped through the streets of East Front St!


Birds of the Stockade



One of the birds to look for when travelling along the Hudson or Mohawk Rivers is the Bald Eagle. They come in various plumages from the juvenile which is dark brown with white wing linings, to the characteristic white head and tail in the adult. It takes 5 years to attain the adult plumage. I've seen nesting eagles in Maine. I know the juveniles as "flying pianos." You can sometimes find them in the area of the Cohoes Falls in the winter and near Lock 7, either perched or in the air. They are attracted to the fish that get ground up in the turbines.

Thursday marks the start of the 107th Annual Christmas Bird Count which is always held December 14 - January 5. For more information about the CBC go to the CBC home page www.audubon.org/bird/CBC and click "Get involved."
